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Robert,

The Senators (Murkowski and Sullivan) and the Governor pressed USCG command to homeport (either year round or for at least part of the year) more vessels in Alaska. (Polar cutters and National Security Cutters) Both vessels carry about 150—200 crew with an equal number of shoreside personnel required. So think of it as 300 – 400 jobs.

Apparently, these decisions are made through a formal process and the process for homeport decisions is underway now with a final report due out of the USCG in September. An example of the process and criteria


The City of Ketchikan shall transmit a duly certified copy of this resolution to the United States Coast Guard and Base Ketchikan Commander as part of the community's recertification








I've attached three drawings of the Ward Cove pier.


The pier is 800 ft long, 70 feet wide, and is -40 feet on the left half of pier as you look at the pictures. It is only 28 feet deed at the far right end of the pier.

We have warehouse space at the building directly behind the pier and with a 14,000 sq ft second floor in that building that is currently unused.

When you have time I would like to sit down and show you a proposal that we developed for Halverson's property which is next to pools property which is next to our blue building. I designed it to accommodate the AMHS, NOAA, and the IFA.
